### **Diocesan Ambassadors**

In September 2018, we were approached by Mr Mullan and asked to act as Diocesan Ambassadors for the School, being commissioned into these roles on the 24th of January 2019 in a ceremony as part of the Diocesan Mass celebrating Catholic Schools' Week. Our initial meeting with Bishop McKeown took place the following month at a meeting where we met with, and got to know, the 40 ambassadors from other schools in the diocese.

In this meeting we also started to discuss matters in the church and our place within it; namely how to make it a more accessible place for young people. Our deliberations had a clear focus on recognising the issues and devising solutions to them and it quickly became apparent that we wanted to play a more active part in connecting the church to the issues that impact on the lives of young people. One initiative that emerged from our discussions led to us taking part in a 'Sleep Out' appeal in the cathedral grounds in March 2019 to raise money for four local homeless charities; our school alone raised  $\mathfrak{L}500$  towards the total amount.

As part of the programme we have also discussed our role models, creating a video talking about how they inspire us. In our first meeting of the 2019/2020 academic year, we have focused on the environmental crisis - an issue that all young people feel strongly about - as well as other more local social and religious issues. We have developed action plans to improve the involvement of young people in the life of the church in both our schools and local parishes. Serving as Diocesan Ambassadors has allowed both of us to forge some great friendships and over our time has given us some great experiences.

# Links to our Primary Schools partners



### Linking Learning Programme

The Linking Learning programme is an innovative approach to ensure a smoother transition to St. Mary's for Primary 7 students. Not only does it form part of our overall Induction Process but it offers a curricular-based learning experience between St Mary's and our partner primary schools, created to address the issue of how St. Mary's can best ensure the continuity of learning as students move from Key Stage 2 to Key Stage 3. The programme supports primary schools and provides opportunities to develop students' capabilities in ICT, Art, Literacy and Technology and Design.

### Curriculum Challenge

Each year Primary 6 students visit for a 'taster day' of life in St. Mary's. They follow a timetable as any of our pupils would and take part in lessons taught by St. Mary's teachers. The day concludes with Sports activities led by the PE Department where Primary 6 skills are put to the test!

### Induction Day

Our induction day, held in June, each year allows those pupils transferring to St. Mary's the chance to experience the school as it runs on an 'average day'. Students follow timetabled classes, use the canteen, meet their teachers and prepare themselves for September.





St Mary's is an 11-19 school that has substantially improved provision in recent years for Post-16 students. We presently offer a wide choice at A Level and pupils can access other subjects through the Roe Valley Learning Community. In addition to the 2 year A Level courses available, we also offer a range of courses for 1 year which allows students to build on their achievement at GCSE prior to further study.



Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) in St Mary's aims to facilitate the following:

- Development of a St Mary's careers information hub in conjunction with the expertise of outside agencies
- Development of students' self-awareness, career exploration and career management skills
- Development of opportunities for work-related learning and employability skills
- Students' ability to avail of Careers Advisors provided by Dfe (Careers Service NI) for guidance and advice
- Development of up-to-date careers resources for students' use, with particular focus on STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Maths) and LMI (Labour Market Information)

As a result of these measures we aim to enable our students to develop their skills and qualities to make informed decisions about their education, training and employment options.

To facilitate this we timetable a Careers Week, where the focus across the school is on how particular subjects relate to different careers pathways and informing students about the rapidly-changing employment market.

Year 8 students participate in the 'Your School Your Business' Programme run by Young Enterprise. They also do Employability for one third of the year. Careers guidance begins in Year 8 as students are introduced to Personal Career Plans and are interviewed by Form Teachers. In Year 10 students select their subjects for GCSE/Level 2. The careers teacher, parents, subject and form teachers and Senior Leadership Team are all involved in assisting the students make realistic, informed choices.

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I left St Mary's in 2011, having achieved the grades I needed to begin my adventure at Heriot-Watt University in Edinburgh\* where I studied Mathematical, Statistical and Actuarial Sciences. At St Mary's, History had always been my strongest subject, followed by Business Studies and Religious Education so I thought it would be a fairly straightforward decision for me when it came to choosing A-level subjects. However, some of my teachers urged me to consider A-Level Maths which they felt would complement my academic strengths - challenge accepted!

Maths is an incredibly complex subject (at least it was for me!) and I am the first to admit that I struggled with my confidence whilst studying it. In spite of my attempts to drop the subject on several occasions, the teachers at St Mary's thought differently and instilled me with some much-needed self-belief! They must have seen something in me that I wasn't aware of, as I eventually finished university with First Class Honours.

Living in Edinburgh, armed with a Maths-focused degree, meant that I had a wide variety of job opportunities available to me. Initially I joined a contract agency specialising in training others in the use statistical software programs. Soon afterwards, gained employment in Tesco Bank which is very interesting and also challenging. Similarly to the ethos and culture of St Mary's, my current workplace is empowering, collaborative and nurturing — both environments have enabled me to reach my true potential.

My time at St Mary's helped me build my confidence through the wide and varied opportunities made available to every student. Just some that spring to mind are: being elected to the School Council; completing the Pope John Paul II award and volunteering for the St Vincent de Paul Society. If it hadn't been for the teachers at St Mary's and the culture they promote, I would never have had developed the confidence to

pursue the degree and career pathway I am on now.

# Careers Giving guidance for the future





At KS3 students get the opportunity to speak to a range of employers during our Career Networking event. They receive information about the curriculum pathways they will follow at KS4. Decisions about the most appropriate curricular pathway for students are informed by robust data tracking which is ongoing throughout KS3.

At KS4 most students have timetabled careers classes one period every week. They are introduced to the concepts of entrepreneurship, labour market information, STEM and work-related learning to enhance their Personal Career Plans. A careers officer from Dfe (Careers Service NI) is available to offer impartial career guidance.

KS5 students receive self-help guides and can access Careers guidance each week. Careers staff are available for individual consultations. Students can access career websites and University and Further Education websites. A range of guest speakers including employers, FE and HE personnel and former students are scheduled to assist them access meaningful information. Students are encouraged to avail of work experience and industrial visits are facilitated wherever possible.



St Mary's plays an integral part in the Roe Valley Learning Community (RVLC). St. Mary's ensures joint delivery and sharing of best practice through shared curriculum choices, shared careers guidance, shared development in the use of ICT and shared enrichment activities to underpin and nurture friendships across all schools.

The developed collaborative partnerships with other schools in the Roe Valley denotes St. Mary's and its partner schools as innovators in collaborative education in Northern Ireland.

Shared links between St. Mary's and Limavady High School continue to strategically develop under Shared Education in the Roe Valley (SERV). These links include: shared curriculum choices from Year 8 to 14, joint staff development, shared improvement focuses and shared capital builds. In 2014 both schools



were successful in moving forward in the OFMDFM Shared Campuses Programme.

St. Mary's will enjoy a purpose built Sixth Form Centre and Careers and Employability hub, whilst Limavady High School will enjoy a STEM centre – both of which will enrich the opportunities afforded to all students in the Roe Valley area.

## Sports News

St Mary's is justly proud of its sporting traditions, having achieved many honours over the years in a wide variety of sports. We offer a varied range of sports, both during timetabled lessons and in after-school provision. Pupils can avail of the opportunity to take part in soccer, Gaelic football, camogie, rugby, netball and athletics. Our school teams encompass every year group from Year 8 to Year 14. As part of the 60th Anniversary celebrations the Key Stage 3 pupils are taking part in a 60k running Challenge during PE classes, with winners in each year group receiving prizes.

This year's Senior boys Gaelic team (U20) have qualified for the quarter finals of the Ward Cup, which takes place in January. The new year also sees Years 8,9 and 11 compete in their respective Ulster competitions.


The Gleann na Ro initiative comprises students from St Marys, Limavady, Gael Colaiste Doire and St Patricks, Dungiven, competing in football and camogie. As we go to press this year the Senior girls Gleann na Ro team have reached the Division D final having beaten St Aidan's, Cootehill (Cavan).

On an individual level, St Mary's students continue to excel in a wide range of sports. Travis Baur represented N Ireland in the World Youth Darts Masters tournament. As well as this two of our Year 11 students, David Monteith and Louis Woods, competed in the World Kick-boxing championships in Germany in October, eventually meeting each other in the Under 61 kg category final, with



David winning gold and Louis winning silver. Finally, Year 12 student, Sophie McIntyre, has been selected to represent Ireland at Bowls in a high-performance training camp in Spain.

The PE Department are also involved in number of cross-community sporting activities such as the Causeway Coast and Glens 'Stick and Ball' and 'New friends, New Sport - Ladies Gaelic Football for All' initiative run by St Canice's Ladies GFC.
